

Everyone Has a Voice

ChildServe Speech Therapy Uses Collaboration, Customization and Fun to Help Kids Connect with Their World



ChildServe's Speech-Language Pathology program helps children communicate effectively and connect with their world. Our speech therapists have a wide range of expertise to treat special conditions that may impact a child's developmental areas like talking, understanding, feeding, social skills and decision-making. From practicing articulation to learning how to navigate a new communication device, we're celebrating all the ways speech therapy at ChildServe brings out each child's unique voice.

Freddie was born 16 weeks early and spent the first five months of his life in the hospital. Like many children born prematurely, Freddie's development was delayed. When he began speech therapy at 2, he had less than 20 words in his vocabulary and could not communicate effectively. After just nine months in speech therapy, Freddie's vocabulary has skyrocketed.

"Freddie has learned his colors and ABCs, can count to 20 and knows many other words," said his mom, Kellie. "Now he is better able to communicate, and his growing vocabulary has helped reduce his frustration. Freddie loves going to ChildServe and playing with his therapists."

By time he was 2, **Weston** was not speaking or making many sounds besides "mama" and "dada." Understandably, Weston was often frustrated when unable to communicate his wants, needs and feelings, causing harmful and disruptive behavior that was taking a toll on the whole family. When Weston began receiving speech therapy at ChildServe, things quickly took a turn for the better.

"Weston's speech therapist, Lindsay, immediately began teaching him sign language to help him easily communicate, and he picked up on it right away," said Weston's mom, Becky. "Weston is doing exceptionally well and has met many of his goals. He is putting more than two words together to make a sentence and can communicate his needs without frustration. We're so grateful for ChildServe and Lindsay for their dedication to helping kids like Weston succeed."





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When **Emerson** began speech therapy two years ago, his goal was to begin speaking verbally. Since receiving an autism diagnosis, his goals have shifted and today, 4-year-old Emerson is working toward communicating his wants and needs in whatever way works best for him.

"His speech therapist, Payton, goes the extra mile with Emerson by working to meet his sensory needs while providing speech therapy," said his mom, Denicia. "I can see the trust Emerson has developed with Payton over the last two years. Today, Emerson can communicate with his electronic augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) device, can speak some words verbally and uses guided sign language."

At 18 months old, **Leo** had three words in his vocabulary. When Leo was enrolled in Child*Serve*'s Autism Day Program, he began receiving speech therapy to help him communicate his thoughts, feelings, wants and needs more effectively. Now, 4-year-old Leo's communication skills are flourishing.

"Leo is speaking in full sentences and continues to increase his verbal output," said his mom, Anna. "The team at Child Serve has been amazing at helping Leo achieve his goals. They helped us trial an AAC device which helped tremendously with his communication. Everyone on Leo's team has collaborated to provide the best outcome for his speech goals. They have done an excellent job communicating with us as a family and working with Leo's strengths to tailor an approach that works best for him to learn. We are so impressed with the support Leo has received at Child Serve and the progress he has made."



Whether practicing verbal speech like Freddie, learning sign language like Weston, mastering an AAC device like Leo, or a combination of communication methods like Emerson, at Child*Serve*, we believe every child has a voice. The Child*Serve* speech therapy team is proud to partner with families to connect little hearts and minds with their world.

The Community Foundation of Johnson County Supports ChildServe's Autism Day Program Amid Expansion

The Community Foundation of Johnson County has partnered with Child*Serve* to support our Autism Day Program. Child*Serve* received a \$5,000 grant from the organization to purchase supplies for the two Autism Day Program classrooms that will be added to our building in Coralville. These classrooms are part of a larger, on-going expansion project that will double the footprint of Child*Serve* – lowa City. The generosity of the Community Foundation of Johnson County also helped purchase sensory learning walls and child-sized tables and chairs for the classrooms.

Child*Serve*'s Autism Day Program is the only one of its kind in lowa and currently serves 30 children, ages 2 through 6, and their families. The program offers specialized weekday care for children with autism spectrum disorder. Children receive positive behavioral support from staff along with occupational, speech and physical therapy on-site during the day to promote overall health and development.
